Tuberculosis Christmas Seals designs changed yearly. Proceeds used throughout the country to combat tuberculosis. Surplus seals ordered destroyed by the American National Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis Association.

All seals were issued in sheets of 100 in rows of ten by ten, except the seals of 1907 and 1908.

Booklet panes have straight edges on three sides and perforated on left side where ther eis a stub, except No. 4b which is a vertical strip of three with stub at top. The panes of six were made up in books of 24 and 48 seals and sold for 25c and 50c, and panes of three in books of 9 seals and sold for 10c. The grilled gum has small square depressions like on a waffle.

Type I comes overprinted "EASTER 1909" in block letters 5 mm, high, in two lines reading up at an angle of 45 degrees and printed in violet, silver and bronze. This is a rivitate overprint.

In listing compound perforations (14y12) the horizontal line of perforations is always given first and followed by the vertical line of perforations.

Type I. Booklet panes are of 10 seals, 2 horizontal by 5 vertical and straight edges on all four sides, They were cut from the sheets of 100 and can be plated by certain flaws which occur on both. Sheets have union label imprint on top margin in brown.

Type II booklet panes are the same but have a perforated margin at top and stub attached. These will be difficult to plate as makeup of sheet is not known. One or both vertical margins are rouletted on Number 22e; perforated on Numbers 22f and 22h and Number 22i is rouletted 12½ on left perforated 12½ on right, Numbers 22j and 22k are booklet panes of 10 seals arranged 5 x 2.
