N 1904, in Denmark, the government issued a Christmas Stamp, with the King's head and the word "ful" the same as our "Yule" on it. It was not good for postage, only as a "sticker" for Christmas letters, post-cards and packages. The proceeds from it were to go toward building a tuberculosis hospital for little dren. It succeeded beyond all expectation, four million would at an extra or half a cent entires. Denwark has

children. It succeeded beyond all expectation, four million being sold at an oere, or half-a-cent apiece. Denmark has continued it since to maintain tuberculosis work, and the sale in the native land of Hans Christian Anderson has doubled each year.

WHY THE RED CROSS ISSUED THE STAMP.

America needs such a stamp, but her post-office officials cannot issue or handle it under the present postal laws; and a special act of Congress would be necessary. Jacob Reis, himself a Dane, wrote an eloquent article, published in the Outlook of July 6, 1907, urging government action in the matter, but there were too many difficulties in the way. It seemed hopeless to try, but at this junction the Red Cross, which exists for just such emergencies, took it up.

The Red Cross is a great national organization, with branches in each state, formed to act in times of crisis and to render aid in war, pestilence and famine. Tuberculosis, the great White Plague, is the most terrible pestilence in the known world, claiming one death out of every seven. The Red Cross has taken up tuberculosis work, therefore, as part of its "peace activity." The present time is one of crisis in the war against consumption. Each State needs edu ation and awakening in the subject, and money for the work. The Red Cross, therefore, with the approval of the postal authorities, took up the Christmas Stamp last Christmas, and tried it in one State.

WHERE THE CHRISTMAS STAMP STARTED.

This was the little State of Delaware-very small, very conservative, not given to enthusiasms, and having only a few shacks in a woodland meadow near Wilmington as a tuberculosis hospital. The State as a whole was ignorant and uninterested on the subject, yet the stamp, printed and put on the market only eighteen days before Christmas, amazed everyone by its sensational record. Fifty thousand had been printed to sell at one cent apiece. They went in a week, and then the stamp got into Philadelphia, where the Pennsylvania Red Cross welcomed it and backed it, and the North American gave it splendid aid. The Delaware schools sold it, the Women's Clubs in Delaware took it up, the newspapers gave columns to it, the department stores, banks, drug stores and hotels sold it. It was sold in the corridors of the Wilmington Federal Building, by permission from the government, though not the post-office itself. The presses in the last few days before Christmas ran night and day to supply the demand. People used the stamps on packages and letters, and business firms on their correspondence. Nearly four hundred thousand

were sold, and nearly three thousand dollars cleared from this small unobtrusive penny stamp.

WHAT THE STAMP DID FOR DELAWARE.

With this money the Delaware Red Cross first brought an educational anti-tuberculosis exhibit to Delaware, which was visited by twenty thousand people in ten days. The clubs, granges, city boards, teachers, clergymen, labor unions, state officials, were all specially invited on special days, and the whole State was waked up. A nurse was sent to the Sanitarium, and a free dispensary supplied with milk and eggs,drugs, and a visiting nurse for the consumptive poor, and this has gone on all year. One thousand dollars has been set aside as a nucleus toward building a hospital. Delaware is now decidedly interested in tuberculosis work, and all this was done in eighteen days, by a penny stamp.

THE PLAN FOR 1908.

The American National Red Cross, this year, has decided to issue the Christmas Stamp in every State. A beautiful stamp has been especially designed by Howard Pyle, the famous artist. It bears a wreath of holly, and "Merry Christmas" and Happy New Year." It will be on sale at the Red Cross headquarters in each State, and it probably can also be obtained from local dealers in almost every town after the first of November, 1908. It will be sold in sheets, like an ordinary stamp, and also in small books, 9 for 10 cents, 24 for 25 cents, 48 for 50 cents, like the government stamps.

The Christmas Stamp is not good for postage. It will not carry any kind of mail, but any kind of mail will carry it. Each one who uses this holiday stamp will help to "stamp out the White Plague." It has been printed this time by the million to supply the demand, so any quantity can be ordered.

but cash must be sent with each order, this rule having been followed last year with success. Nobody makes any profit on the Christmas Stamp, but it was found last Christmas that every one was glad to help it along on these terms. For an order of one stamp or a thousand the price is the same, except in the little books, which add the cost of the binding, just as the government does. The proceeds in each State go toward tuberculosis work in that State.

During the run of the stamp last year, Jacob Reis wrote a congratulatory letter to the Delaware Red Cross, and Governor Stuart of Pennsylvania, Secretary Root, and Secretary Taft, all telegraphed their approval and good wishes. This year the stamp goes forward to a wider usefulness. Its value will be twofold. It educates and arouses. It gives each one a chance to contribute, if only a penny, to the war against the White Plague, and provides a fund for needed work. If little Delaware made it succeed, any other State, north or south, can do so. The National Red Cross brings this Christmas Stamp to the whole nation this year. If each American man, woman and child buys but one, sixty-five millions will be sold, and tuberculosis work from Maine to California will be reinforced and urged forward. When Denmark has succeeded, can America fail?

The question has again arisen this year as to whether it would be worth while for local agents selling Red Cross Christmas Seals to use some type of automatic vending machine in certain places, and we are therefore writing to you with a definite proposal on this matter, to which we would invite your early and careful attention.

After canvassing the field for the most favorable proposition which we could secure for our agents, we have received from the United States Automatic Vending Company a conditional offer of which we think favorably enough to pass it on to you for your consideration. This company has agreed that, in case we can secure orders for at least 100 machines, they will manufacture and sell to our agents penny-in-the-slot vending machines good for selling either Red Cross Seals or Postage stamps for \$10.50 each. These machines would be manufactured in a specially designed case, bearing a suitable legend, and would be guaranteed to wend perfectly. Inasmuch as these machines usually sell in metal cases for \$40.00, the price which we have been able to secure seems most favorable.

With the American mania for playing slot machines, and with the curiosity that such a unique machine would create, we feel that you would be justified in making an investment in these automatic vendors for use in cigar stores, drug stores, branch postoffices, railroad stations, and elsewhere. In many places, it is impossible to place a human selling agent, and in many other places, the clerks of stores are too busy at the holiday season to vend the seals. In such places, these automatic vending machines would be of great service.

The enclosed circulars will describe in greater detail the machine which is offered to you. We also enclose a statistical statement showing the results of two machines used in New York

RED CROSS CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE CAMPAIGN IN OHIO. RESULTS IN 1910—PLANS FOR 1911.

During the fall of 1910 a committee was organized in Cleveland, with the idea of enlarging and organizing the Red Cross Seal Campaign so that the funds collected could be concentrated under one management and some definite work started throughout the State as a whole.

Heretofore the seal sale had been conducted through scattered agencies in various cities and the proceeds used to aid the local work but in many instances the revenue was so small that it was hard to see any tangible results.

The plan was adopted of handling the State sales through the Ohio Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. It was then too late in the season to adopt the plan throughout the State, the National Red Cross having already appointed agents in a number of places, namely, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus, Toledo, Marietta, Mt. Vernon, Canton, Delaware County and Steubenville, but the agency for the balance of the State was secured.

The agreement with the National Red Cross at Washington was that 12½% of the total receipts from the seal sale was to be remitted to it, and after defraying its expenses in connection with the printing and distributing of the seals and advertising matter, the balance was to be given to the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. The Ohio Society therefore decided to handle the seal sale in two ways:

- 1. To give to city and county societies the exclusive right to sell the seals in their territory, they to retain 75% of the proceeds for local work, returning the other 25% to the State Society, said society remitting 12½% to the National Headquarters, and retaining the other 12½% for 5tate work.
- In such districts as were not covered by local societies, agents remitted the full proceeds to the State Society, which society remitted 12½% to the National Headquarters.

(NOTE: Some of these agents under this second heading had territory assigned to them, and some were store-keepers or bankers who only sold the seals at their places of business.)

The sale for 1910 in Ohio, throughout the territory not assigned to city agents direct from Washington, covered 310 towns and cities. Several of these cities, however, had surrounding territory assigned to them, and we have no detailed record of such sales. The total number of towns and cities where the seals were sold we estimate exceeded 425. The total receipts from the 1910 seal sale throughout the State amounted to \$37.255.27, slatishuted as follows:

Several of the larger cities sold scals in adjacent territory but did not keep separate the receipts from the same, hence we have no definite record of the sales in such districts.

The Ohio State Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis has been appointed agent for the entire State for 1911, and all applications for sub-agencies will be handled through it upon the following terms:

- Societies for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will be given the agency for their territory, with the privilege of retaining 75% of the gross receipts for their local work, the other 25% going to the Ohio Society which will, in turn, remit half, or 12½%, of the total to the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.
- 2. All other agents will remit their entire receipts to the Ohio State Society, which will retain 871/2% for State work, remitting the other 121/2% to the National Society as usual

Applications for agencies, and all orders for seals should be addressed to "S. Livingston Mather, Chairman State Seal Sale Committee, 501 St. Clair Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio". It is expected that the seals will be ready for delivery early in November, and applications for agencies should therefore be made at once.

The Government postal authorities have found it necessary to be very strict this year in their ruling that the seals be placed only on the backs of mail matter. The particular attention of all agents is called to this, and agents are urged to give this most important point wide publicity.

The ultimate aim of the Ohio State Society is, to aid in organizing as many local societies for the prevention of tuberculosis as may be necessary to cover the State. Some of these will be city societies, some county societies, and a few covering two or more counties.

We earnestly hope that everyone in Ohio will lend his or her aid to the work, so that we may sell at least one seal for every person in the state. Five Million Seals Sold is our aim this year.

Preventorium Care

Children threatened by tuberculosis are cared for at the beautiful River Crest Preventorium of the Kensington Dispensary, where 25 beds are maintained throughout the year for Christmas Seal children.

All children are given thorough examinations before admission and at regular times while under treatment. X-ray pictures are included.

Some children have latent childhood infections found by X-rays. Others have been in contact with tuberculosis in their homes. All need special care in order to avoid active tuberculosis.

No children with manifest tuberculosis are taken as the service is entirely preventive. School instruction is provided that the children may not fall behind in their grades.

Children between 3 and 13 years of age are selected because of their health needs and without regard to race, creed, or social standing.

VISITING NURSING SERVICE. Taberculous families receive systematic home supervision by the Council's public health nurses. If the patient cannot go to the sanatorium, he is supervised in his home: a plan of diet and care, assistance in securing proper food and Uring arrangements, examination of others living in the home, and instruction how the disease can be avoided is carried out.

TUBERCULOSIS CLINICS. In crowded districts for examination and medical care of persons having tuberculosis, or those in contact with the disease. A special bed for pneumothorax treatment is maintained throughout the year at the Mercy Hospital.

CHILDREN'S TUBERCULOSIS SERVICE. A group of children infected with tuberculosis who remain in their homes have intensive nursing supervision and periodic X-ray examinations that their progress toward health may be compared with that of preventorium children.

SOCIAL AND MEDICAL RESEARCH. Studies of special problems and keeping up-to-date information for the direction of work and for use of physicians, teachers, social and health workers. Cooperation in laboratory research of the National Tuberculosis Association. PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION. A continuous city-wise deducation campaign on taberculosis and other health problems using all modern methods. Special campaigns on early diagnosis and community problems, institutes and conferences, exhibits, window displays, pamphlets, publications, advisory and information service.

TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC ASSOCIATION. To increase the effectiveness of clinic control of tuberculosis in Philadelphia. Courses of instruction for nurses, and tabulation of reports of all chest clinics. Meetings and conferences of doctors and nurses.
