This stamp is lithographed by Strobridge and is perforated 12. It is in black, red and green with the green running solid through the marpins. Twenty-five seals, each with a different desiren, have been sold to the public at the holiday season since the organized tuberrulosis movement got under way. This is how it started:

Twentv-seven years ago, a blond young Dane was looking over the Christmas mail at the post office in Conenhagen. It was a cold wintry twillight evering and this young man saw joyous, happy children following their parents to well-lit, well-provided homes to partake of delicious food. It was good to be alive at Christmas time!

The first Christmas seal sale in the United States was promoted 25 years ago by Emily P. Bissell (who saw an article in a magazine telling of the young Danish mail clerk and the seals) of Wilmington, Delaware, to raise money for a tuberculosis hospital on the banks of the Brandy-wine river.
