WAS TO BE CLOSED SOON

Those Interested Feel That Good Work
Is Being Done and It Would Be
Wise to Continue.

Members of the Delaware Anti-Tuberculosis Society are much encouraged by the fact that the Delaware branch of the National Red Cross Society has decided to co-operate in the fight against consumption in this city and state, and they are now firmly convinced that their campaign, at first organized and conducted under great difficulties, will develop into a well regulated and general anti-tuberculosis work.

Members of the executive board of the society had their regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon at the dispensary. Their meetings are held the second Wednesday in every month. Dr. John J. Buckley, M. D., an ex-kinsman, member of the organization, presided. He is one of the best known physicians in the state and also an expert on tuberculosis. Still another of the most eminent physician in the state.

The last stamp book contained the Christmas stamp in the city and state for the sum of \$1,000.00, which is about all the Anti-Tuberculosis Society has to work with, and according to the members of the little organization that the sale of these stamps will bring in a considerable sum of money. It was decided yesterday to keep open all winter the sanitarium in Wilmington.

The hospital has been doing a very amount of good. It takes a large sum of money to keep it up, however, and as the society is without a very large treasury, the members found that they would have to close it as soon as the cold weather set in. This they were willing to do because the institution was doing so much good, but the members were making such rapid progress recently.
